2. Sign in/Welcome:

3. Police Report:

- a. There has been a bit of activity related to neighbors calling in when observing suspicious individuals. Off of Lead a call came in on 4/15 where a car alarm went off. Two suspects were stopped based on information received in calls. They were charged with burglary, conspiracy and stolen property.
- b. A stolen vehicle was recovered off of Douglas in conjunction with a shoplifting call. The individual responsible was taken into custody.
- c. Last week a stolen vehicle was recovered in Cirby Ranch. It had been sitting for a while and a police volunteer reported it.
- d. Cirby and Pleasant Grove have been set up as vehicle warning areas. This has already resulted in several arrests.
- e. Jim asked about speed trailers on Johnson Ranch. These are generally placed by the police at the request of neighbors.

4. Guest Speaker, Mike Beauregard:

- a. In his introduction, Mr. Beauregard noted that since the Task Force was put into place auto thefts have been reduced by approximately 50%. Part of the drop is because identify theft has increased versus auto theft.
- b. Recently an individual was taken into custody who, using a stolen identity, bought a number of high end cars. Identity theft is a major factor in car theft. The other factor is using stolen cars as transportation from point A to point B. When point B is reached another car is stolen, etc.
- c. Here are a couple of reasons cars are easily stolen. During the winter people will warm up the car in the driveway making the theft one of convenience. Second, in Roseville half the car thefts are from "shaved keys." These can be anything from an old key to a pair of

scissors. These which work on older cars where the ignition has loosened up over time. Another problem is people simply leave their car keys in car parked in their driveway.

- d. One fairly good deterrent is the Club because most of these thefts are not professionals. They're in a rush and seeing the Club will move onto another vehicle.
- e. Even if the car is parked in the garage, a metal garage door isn't always a deterrent. The problem is a thief can push a hook in between panels and snag the release hook. There isn't an easy answer to this problem because to disable the pull hook can create a risk in an emergency situation when the homeowner may need to quickly release the door.
- f. Craig's List is another area of potential problems when, i.e. selling a car. Thieves, when ostensibly buying a vehicle, use bad checks and forged "cashiers checks" in order to steal the car. Weekend transactions are often a scam as a way to prevent the seller from knowing a check is bad or verifying information. Mr. Beauregard recommended doing any Craig's List type of transaction at your bank, at the police department parking lot, or in a public place. NEVER take cash except within a bank and even then a transfer between banks is preferable
- g. Catalytic Converter thefts are always high in number. There are ways to protect it, i.e. skid plates, or other types of coverings. The etching may only help catch a thief. It does not prevent the theft. Today they converters are shipped to China since the recyclers are no longer good sources for unloading them. This is do to high levels of pressure from law enforcement.
- h. Miscellaneous points included:
  - Many of the thieves in our area come in from Sacramento County. The is primarily because Placer residents tend to be more affluent.
  - A lot of thefts take place in fitness club parking lots where wallets, phones, and tablets are readily accessible.
  - Placer county is more effective than other regions in cooperation between agencies, police, DA, courts, highway patrol, etc.

  - iii. Additionally, we will take the following action. Jim will hand out a flyer to the Rocky Ridge shops regarding booths.
  - iv. Regarding food, we will use a 120 participant figure for catering proposals. Geoff will talk to L & L. Vicki will talk to Chipotle, Jim will talk to the food trucks at the Thursday Food Truck events, and Scott will talk to Panda Express.
  - v. Also Jim, when setting up at the Tuesday Night Downtown program will check with the Bounce House people to see if they would be interested in participating as a way of promoting their service.
- b. Scheduling a water speaker: Jim talked to Sean. He believes Sean wants to set up large group meetings rather than meeting with each association individually. He is planning on having two town meetings. There are no dates set for these yet. We do know that one of the meetings would be at Maidu. This means it is less likely that we need to do something ourselves, but we will keep an eye on how this progresses and readdress the issue as needed.
- c. Giving Back to Our Community: Jim has reassured us that if Melinda stopped supporting the newsletter he'd be able to get a replacement right away. We examined the provided figures (see attached.) As a result we agreed to the figure previously considered.
