



2. Sign in/Welcome

3. Elections of Officers: The new officers for this year are Scott Reid, President, Vicki Miller, Vice President, Geoff Kragen, Secretary, and Mary Steele, Treasurer. Geoff moved, Shirley seconded the appointment of the individuals to the offices as listed above.

4. Police Report:

- a. Cal Walstad suggested individuals sign up for the Roseville Public Safety and Neighborhood News via the City of Roseville website (see attached example).
- b. Bryan Hays reported on incidents recorded in the above noted news letter for the early weeks of the month. These included break-ins, a number of vehicle thefts, and vandalism.
- c. Cal Walstad noted that the Speed Trailer on McLaren has significantly slowed speed.

He reported Sargent School was vandalized. There was also a mutual assault between two adults at the school at 1:00 AM.

He pointed out there has been an "uptake" of crime in the neighborhood. He noted that some of these reports which have been coming into him should actually have gone directly to dispatch. When seeing a suspicious vehicle take a picture, but <u>do not</u> follow.

There have been two more neighborhood watch groups form within the Maidu Association boundaries this last month. Officer Hays emphasized the importance of getting to know one's neighbors in order to be more aware of activities/person(s) who don't fit in.

Precious metal theft has increased. Door kick-ins are still occurring. Heroin is rampant within the city which is probably a factor in the increase in crime. The is supported by the uptick which is mostly property crime.

- d. A discussion arose over the potential problems in distinguishing what is suspicious and what isn't when contacting the police. This came about because one attending neighbor reported her son and been questioned by the police because of a report of "suspicious" behavior. After an extensive discussion, the individual who reported the young man was also present, the only conclusion that could be reached was there are no easy answers to this conundrum. But it does emphasize the need for neighbors to get to know one another.



Northeast Roseville

Olympus, burglary: Overnight September 18/19, someone went into an open garage in the 1700 block of Orvietto Drive and stole a set of golf clubs and a silver and red Cannondale mountain bike.

Harding/Galleria area, vehicle burglary: Between 6:15 and 7:45 p.m. September 16, someone smashed the window of a pickup parked in the 1200 block of Roseville Parkway, and stole a laptop computer bag and its contents, and other items of value.

East Roseville Parkway, theft: Between 1 and 5 p.m. September 15, someone stole jewelry from a home for sale on Oak Hill Way, during a real estate open house. The jewelry had been stored out of sight in an unlocked cupboard.

Tip: Thefts during real estate open houses aren't common, but they do happen occasionally. In addition to closely supervising visitors, you might want to put your jewelry and other small, easily concealed valuables in a locked cabinet, safe or other area that's not accessible to visitors.

East Roseville Parkway, vehicle burglary: Overnight September 21/22, someone broke the window of an SUV parked at a hotel on Taylor Road, and stole a laptop computer and other electronics.

Galleria, vehicle theft: Between 4 and 7 p.m. September 15, someone stole a tan 1995 Honda Accord sedan from the 1100 block of Galleria Blvd.

Galleria, vandalism: Between approximately 8 and 9 a.m. September 22, someone broke the window of a car in the 1000 block of Galleria Blvd. Nothing was taken.

Creekside, thefts from vehicles: Between 5:15 and 9:25 p.m. September 16, someone stole a 3' tall traditional India drum from an unlocked car in the 1200 block of Galleria Blvd. Between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. the same day, someone smashed the window of two cars in the 1100 block of Galleria, stealing an expensive purse, a laptop computer and several other items of value.

Johnson Ranch, theft: Between September 2 and 3, someone went into an unlocked car on Templeton Court and stole a leather satchel, loose change and other small items.

Johnson Ranch, theft: Between September 16 and 18, someone went into an unlocked car in the 1600 block of Palatia Drive and stole a trumpet and an African drum.

Johnson Ranch, vehicle burglary: Overnight September 21/22, someone broke into two vehicles in an apartment complex at 8800 Sierra College Blvd., and stole tools that had been left in plain sight on the vehicles' seats.

Maidu, burglary attempt: Sometime during the week of September 7-13, someone tried to pry the door of a house in the 1900 block of

Branding Iron Way, damaging the door jamb. No one made entry and nothing was taken.

Maidu, burglary: Between September 13 and 16, broke into a house on Ridgedale Court through the back door, stealing the television and other items from the house, and stealing a car from the garage. The car was found, undamaged and unoccupied, by CHP in the north Sacramento area on September 17.

Maidu, theft: Between midnight and 10 a.m. September 15, someone went into an unlocked car in the 2400 block of Valley Forge Way and stole some small items.

Sierra Gardens, car stolen, another stolen car dumped nearby: Between 5:30 and 7:30 p.m. September 16, someone stole a Honda Accord four-door sedan from the 1600 block of Douglas Blvd. CHP's Yuba-Sutter division found it on September 19, unoccupied, with some parts missing. In a possibly connected case, on the evening of September 16, a Roseville officer found an unoccupied Honda Civic in the 300 block of North Sunrise Avenue. It had been reported stolen from Yuba City earlier the same day. It was released to its rightful owner.


Sierra Gardens, vehicle burglary: Between 12:30 and 3:30 p.m. September 18, someone broke the window of a car parked in the 300 block of Sunrise Avenue, and took a purse, clothing and other items.

Lead Hill, vehicle burglaries: Between 5:50 and 7:15 a.m. September 18, someone broke the window of a car parked near a fitness center and the Miner's Ravine trailhead in the 300 block of North Sunrise Avenue and stole a leather satchel, clothing, a portable GPS and other valuables. Between 1 and 2:45 p.m. September 21, someone broke the window of an SUV in the same area and stole a purse, cell phone and iPad that the victim had concealed under the seats.

Tip: Fitness center and trailhead parking lots are prime hunting grounds for thieves. They know you're likely to leave valuables in your vehicle and be gone for a while. Leave your valuables at home or keep them with you. If we still can't talk you out of leaving valuables in the car, then put them in the trunk (not in the passenger compartment) BEFORE, not after you get to your destination.

Lead Hill, traffic collision: At 10:20 a.m. September 22, officers responded to a non-injury traffic collision in the Roseville Automall. A driver (a customer driving his own car) drove through a fence, collided with a light fixture and hit four vehicles parked in an overflow lot. The 62-year-old male from Roseville was arrested on suspicion of DUI.

Lead Hill, theft, arrest made: Between 9 and 9:30 p.m. September 23, someone stole a purse and iPhone from a bar in the 100 block of North Sunrise. The victim used the phone's GPS tracking feature, which located her phone at the Miner's Ravine trailhead at Sculpture Park. Officers responded, contacted a suspect parked at that location, and recovered the victim's property. A 34-year-old Sacramento man was arrested on suspicion of theft and driving on a suspended license.
