2. Sign in/Welcome:

3. Police Report: Officer Hays provided the following information.

- a. There was a weapons arrest made in Maidu Park on February 25th. The individual involved was a passenger in a taxi. He apparently planned on stealing the cab. The act appeared drug related and was tied to a problematical house on West Colonial.
- b. There was a car break-in and purse theft near Johnson Ranch Racquet Club. This was an act of opportunity. The officer again warned against leaving valuables in a car.
- c. On March 7th there was an attempted residential burglary. This was a door kick-in and the home owner was present so it is presumed that when the perpetrator realized the house was occupied, they fled. No one seen.
- d. On March 16th there was a robbery in the Maidu neighborhood next to a business area.
- **4.** Special Presentation by Sean Bigley regarding the current drought:
 - a. Mr. Bigley spoke to the city's change from voluntary to mandatory water reduction.
 - b. The Folsom Reservoir is Roseville's primary source of water. It is holding significantly less water than what is needed over the long term, but the volume held has significantly improved as a result of February rain.
 - c. The city has created a Drought Management Team, which is currently approved for eight employees. The staff is being paid out of the drought emergency funds.

- d. The city has petitioned the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to reduce flow out of Folsom. The bureau has reduced draw down. (see attached)
- e. The city has the authority to put a drought surcharge on water charges to help Roseville Utilities to keep operating as demand goes down and costs go up. The utility has put funds aside to offset these shifts so accordingly the city has not implemented the surcharge, as of yet.
- f. Back up wells ran, but only for a month, to protect Folsom levels. The February rain ended the necessity. This is high cost because of energy expense. Additional wells are planned. The Aquifers have enough storage for three to four years. These are draw down recovery. The city also has contracts for back up supply from Placer County.
- g. (The following, g-o, are responses to questions) The requirement to reduce 20 percent usage is based on a comparison to usage based on the last two years.
- h. If the homeowner registers on the city's water usage website they can see how they are doing. The website is not providing real time information but that from the prior month.
- i. Monitoring is not a big brother situation. The city's focus is primarily on high water users, tier 4. The assumption is, if the home has done everything they can do, they have met the city's expectation. Because of potential economic impact for the homeowner, the city isn't expecting them to lose money by destroying landscaping or pools, etc.
- i. The current level of the water supply will meet the needs for the current year, 2014.
- k. The cash for grass program is active but has no further funds. It is anticipated the program will be funded again in July at the beginning of the next fiscal year.
- 1. Catchment water can be used but generally is only available during rainy periods. Additional waters can be obtained by collection of cold pre-shower water, etc. This may not be economically practical for the amount of water collected..
- m. The question came up regarding the Twin Tunnels taking water from Folsom to send it south. This is a complicated issue which falls under the Bay Conservation Delta Plan. One serious concern is over salinity marching up the delta. The specific concern for the city relates to the Folsom Dam and who would have control over the system.
- n. This led to a question about aboveground storage and specifically the Auburn Dam. The city supports above ground storage. A number of projects are being considered. Regarding the Auburn Dam, the water rights have been lost and there are significant economic issues tied to actual water yield.
- o. It was suggested we contact the State Legislators to encourage more above ground storage.
- **5.** Minutes of previous meeting: David A. moved and Lance seconded that the minutes be approved. Approved.
- **6.** Treasurer's report: The beginning March balance was \$1,864.97. The ending balance is \$1,943.14. The increase reflects 20 registrations for the garage sale.

7. RCONA report:

- a. April 26th will be the next "med take back day. More information will become available as provided by the city.
- b. On May 10^{th} there will be the opportunity to have documents shredded and e-waste accepted.


- a. Burn Area: Nothing to report. Scott will follow-up with Open Space.

We're experiencing unprecedented drought conditions. Folsom Lake, Roseville's primary water supply, has been at record low levels for this time of year and we do not see it getting better soon. Because of that, we all need to do our part to conserve water. The City of Roseville has activated an increased drought stage requiring customers to reduce water use by 20 percent. Read more to find out how this will affect you and ways to conserve!

Folsom Lake looks low. How bad is it and what does it mean for customers?

Folsom Lake has reached critically low levels this year and that means City of Roseville water customers need to conserve water. We're requiring our residential and commercial customers to conserve water by 20 percent. Commercial landscape customers are required to reduce their water use by 30 percent. It's easier than you think! Here are helpful tips to get you started on the road to reduction:

- 1. Reduce your outdoor irrigation! Outdoor water use accounts for about 60 percent of a household's total use.
- 2. Check for leaks! Leaky pipes, faucets and sprinklers can waste hundreds of gallons a month.
- 3. Know your use. Households can track their water use at Roseville.WaterInsight.com and see how to reach a 20 percent reduction!
- 4. Schedule a Water Wise House Call. We can help you identify ways to reduce usage around your home. Call 774-5761 or sign up online at Roseville.ca.us/housecall.

What should customers do if they see a home or business violating water conservation actions?

Are businesses also required to reduce water use?

Will water quality be impacted by the water levels?

The water temperature will increase in Folsom Lake naturally because there is less water in the lake and we are experiencing warmer than average weather. Warmer lake temperatures can mean warmer water delivered to you which may slightly alter the taste. No need to worry, the high quality of the water is the same.

Roseville announces mandatory 20 percent water use reduction due to persistent drought conditions.

Due to persistent drought conditions, the City of Roseville is announcing mandatory water use restrictions of 20 percent for its residential and commercial water customers effective immediately. The water use reductions also require commercial water customers to reduce their outdoor irrigation by 30 percent, bans the washing of cars without a water nozzle or without going to a commercial car wash, prohibits washing of hardscape surfaces unless for health and safety purposes, and prohibits water waste.

"Although our recent storms were welcome, we are still in a drought and the coming months may prove to be challenging with the record low precipitation and snow pack that we have received," said Ed Kriz, Environmental Utilities Director. "The data indicates that this is the level of restriction needed given current circumstances. However, if the drought continues to worsen, we may have to increase the mandatory water use reductions."

"Outdoor irrigation accounts for more than half of a typical home's water use. Eliminating or reducing your irrigation is the quickest and most efficient way to reach your 20 percent water reduction goal," said Lisa Brown, Roseville's Water Efficiency Administrator.

Other effective ways to conserve water include quickly repairing leaks and breaks in irrigation systems, fixing leaking toilets and faucets, and only washing full loads in the laundry and dishwasher. Roseville residential water customers can take the guesswork out of water

conservation by signing up for the free, online WaterInsight program (www.roseville.waterinsight.com). Here water customers can track their water use, compare their usage to similar residences and find easy water saving ideas.

Additional drought information is available on the city's website at www.roseville.ca.us/drought.

Some Roseville residents in Stoneridge and in a small area north of Stanford Ranch Road and east of Highway 65 receive their water from the Placer County Water Agency, some Roseville residents east of Sierra College Boulevard receive water from San Juan Water District, and some Roseville residents on the border of Citrus Heights receive water from the Citrus Heights Water District. Those water customers should contact those water agencies with questions related to their home or business water usage and water-conservation programs those water agencies may offer to their customers.

Stage 2 Mandatory Reduction Requirements

- Water shall be used for beneficial purposes only; all unnecessary and wasteful uses of water are prohibited.
- Water shall be confined to the user's property and shall not be allowed to runoff to adjoining properties, or to the roadside or to the gutter. Care shall be taken not to water past the point of saturation.
- Free-flowing hoses for all uses are prohibited. Automatic shut-off devices shall be attached on any hose or filling apparatus in use.
- Leaking pipes or faulty sprinklers shall be repaired within five calendar days or less if warranted by the severity of the problem as determined in the discretion of the director or his or her designee.
- All pools, spas, and ornamental fountains/ponds shall be equipped with a recirculation pump and shall be constructed to be leak-proof. Pool draining and refilling shall be allowed only to the extent required for health, maintenance, or structural considerations, and must otherwise comply with all applicable federal, state and local stormwater management program requirements, including, but not limited to, the urban stormwater quality management and discharge control ordinance set forth in Chapter 14.20 of Title 14 of the City of Roseville Municipal Code.
- Washing streets, parking lots, driveways, sidewalks or buildings, except as necessary for health or sanitary purposes, is prohibited.
- Residential users shall reduce water usage by 20 percent.
- Washing of vehicles or boats is prohibited except:
 - When using a hose that is equipped with a control nozzle capable of completely shutting
 off the flow of water except when positive action or pressure to maintain the flow of water
 is applied, or

• When washed in either an automatic or manual commercial car wash. This exemption does not apply to temporary car washes, held for fundraising purposes, or to any car wash in which the water is applied via a hand held garden type (non-pressure) hose.

• Other:

- Except for actively programmed sports fields, nonresidential users (including without limitation, commercial, industrial, church and publicly-owned users) shall reduce irrigation by 30 percent for existing landscaping.
- Water shall not be served at restaurants except by request.
