

<u>National Night Out</u> - - *It's America's Night Out Against Crime!* National Night Out (NNO) is a unique event sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and is held the first Tuesday in August (August 4 this year). Last year's NNO campaign involved citizens, law enforcement agencies, civic groups, business, neighborhood organizations and local officials from over 10,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases worldwide.

*National Night Out is designed to:* 1. Heighten crime & drug prevention awareness; 2. Generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime programs, such as Neighborhood Watch; 3. Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police/community partnerships; 4. Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Cities, towns and neighborhoods celebrate NNO with a variety of events and activities, such as: block parties, cookouts, visits from local police and fire departments, ice cream socials, and flashlight walks, contests, and youth programs.

#### Auto Theft

At our May Maidu Neighborhood Association Meeting, Sgt. Mike Beauregard of the CHP and Placer County Auto Theft Task Force spoke to an interested audience about the ways people become victims of auto theft and how to avoid it. The County's Task Force was formed in 2007 in response to the 1,200 cars stolen during the previous year.

The time of carjackings, never common in Placer County anyway, has largely passed because the crime is treated so much more seriously than the simpler theft of the car. One of the newest ways to steal a car is via ID theft. The thief uses a stolen identity to establish a credit record and buy a car. Sgt. Beaure-gard suggested that a relatively easy way to avoid this is to freeze your credit line when you are not actively trying to get a loan or additional credit. Use free credit reports to check for unusual activity.

A common pattern or motivation for theft in this area is for transportation. The thief takes the car, usually because the opportunity presents itself, then uses it to get to the next vehicle to steal. Professional thieves that run chop shops are usually only found in larger cities.

An old favorite for theft is the car left running "to warm up" while the owner returns to the inside of the home. This is more likely to occur during winter months as the car exhaust is easily spotted, and the owner is more likely to be in their warm home. The fastest way to warm an auto engine is to drive it.

For 2005 and older vehicles, a "shaved key" may be used because the ignition gets looser and worn over time, so it can be worked into the starting position more easily without having the actual key. Older Hondas are also known for being easy to break into. The "club" is the cheapest, clearly visible deterrent for older cars. The club can be defeated by cutting the steering wheel, but a thief is more likely to just move on to another car that will be easier to drive off.

Keeping your car in your garage is a great way to protect your car. One exception to this is when a thief can get a long stiff wire under your garage door and can use it to hook on your garage door opener release cord. Once they've pulled the cord, the garage door can be lifted.

If you are selling a car, don't fall for the scam where the buyer offers a cashier's check from their bank for \$20,000, for example. You've agreed to a lower price for the vehicle and they ask you for cash back to make up the difference. The cashier's check, despite appearances, will be counterfeit.

Sgt. Beauregard related a time when a buyer offered to pay cash for one of his vehicles -- thousands of dollars in cash. Beauregard refused to accept the cash directly from the buyer, but went with him to Beauregard's bank where he had the buyer give the money to a teller for deposit in the officer's account. This avoided anyone jumping him for the cash after he accepted it elsewhere, and the teller is better equipped to verify the cash was not counterfeit.

Catalytic converter thefts remain lucrative for thieves. They particularly like to target high-riding vehicles like a Dodge pick-up or the Toyota Tundra -- easy to get under, and these vehicles often have more than one catalytic converter. With a set of clamp cutters, they can execute this theft in 3 to 4 minutes and they are gone. To prevent the theft, compare the price of a skid-plate installed over the converters against the price of your insurance deductible, and it may be money well spent.

Finally, as a watchful neighbor, report suspicious activities that you see. If you see a vehicle you've never seen before on your street, but it isn't suspicious enough to warrant a call to the police, note the car's make, license number, color and when and where you saw it. If it is nothing, no harm done. If it turns out to be involved in a crime, your information may help police find the criminals involved.
