

The Roseville Library is excited to announce that Google Chromebooks, devices that are similar to a laptop, but save documents to the "cloud," are now available to check out. A new drop-in program is open to anyone who wants to learn how to download e-books and audio books to their e-readers or tablets. November is National Native American Heritage Month. All residents are invited to stop by the Maidu Museum and Historic Site to learn, explore, and appreciate the native culture.



3rd Saturday Art Walk. Please join us Saturday, November 17, from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm for the 3rd Saturday Art Walk and Night Out at the Museum. Come and meet Malcolm Margolin, award winning author and founder of Heyday Books. Malcolm will be sharing interesting stories related to his rich experiences with the native community from the past 40 years. Heyday publishes about 25 books per year on California history, natural history, literature, art, and ethnic diversity. Museum doors will open at 6:30 pm. Program starts at 7 pm. This is a free event; light refreshments will be available.

Artistic Expression of Maidu Legends and History by Frank Day is on display though January 19. Frank Day (Ly-dam-lilly), Maidu Indian artist, historian, and storyteller, was born in Berry Creek, California, where he was taught the language and traditions of his tribe by his father Billy Day (Twofoe), a headman and historian of the Konkow Maidu. He was a gifted storyteller and teacher who translated the Maidu perception of the world into colorful narrative images.

Painting over 200 canvases in the last two decades of his life, Frank Day integrated legend, oral tradition and myth into authoritative compositions. They are intense, vital and beautiful; and their content is significant to those involved in California native cultures.

Frank Day was an excellent historian of the Maidu people and one of the most outstanding California Indian Artists to preserve his heritage through expressions of Maidu legends and history in his paintings. His paintings describe Konkow Maidu ways, rituals and ceremonies, some of which he never saw or experienced. The artist said of his paintings, "I talk my paintings, say them, sing them, and then paint them."
