

Good Landscaping Adds Value

Vast amounts of landscaping suffered with the drought last year, but this year the rules were lessened and there is still much suffering. Still waiting for the official word that the drought is over? Cost of renewal an issue? Just don't feel like mowing a lawn anymore? Here's some helpful information:

Drought or not, California is going to initiate water conservation measures in 2017. More stringent watering rules are on the horizon. The City of Roseville will rebate customers \$.50 per square foot of turf grass removed and replaced with water efficient landscape up to \$1000 per address. Download the Cash for Grass application or call 774-5761 for more information (from the City of Roseville website). A study by Applied Ecological Services Inc., shows that maintaining a quarter acre (about the size of our entire lot) of native plants over 20 years costs \$750, compared with the whopping \$5,000 price tag of maintaining a lawn of non-native turf grass.

Landscaping is the first thing visitors or buyers see and it reflects well – or poorly – on other homes in the neighborhood. Good landscaping can add up to 28% to overall home value, says landscape economist John Harris. Just taking your landscaping from “good” to “excellent” in terms of design, condition, and placement, can add 6% to 7% to a home's value, according to a Clemson University study.

Even adding a tree adds value to a home. How much? The National Tree Benefit Calculator can tell you what it's worth. Plug in your zip code and type/size of tree and this site tells you how it affects CO2 reduction, stormwater runoff, property value, and energy savings, and the shade comes free with the tree.

If your neighbors manicure their lawns and yours is a jumble of weeds or worse, their great landscaping will make yours look even shabbier and hurt the value of your home. There is hope - <http://www.landscape-america.com/lawns/lawncare/seeding/revival.html> will let you choose the extent of renovation you can afford or want to tackle. Surprisingly, just watering will bring back the deadest looking grass without replanting as the roots are still viable much of the time. Dead spots can be reseeded with matching grass types. Ever notice how the dog and golf course can green up the lawn even in winter? So can you. Fertilize well now and the lawn is still metabolizing so it greens up (first number of the 3 on the fertilizer bag is Nitrogen for greening). It'll stay green and doesn't need mowing much in the colder winter months until about February when it'll start getting needy again. The neighborhood will appreciate it.

Let's review: Cost of removing turf can be reduced by the City rebate program. Using native plants instead of lawn eliminates mowing. Water bill will be reduced if you remove your grass. Home value will increase significantly. Rejuvenated landscaping will reflect well on you and the neighborhood.
