

Almost Time for Park Clean-Up!

The annual Maidu Park Clean-up is coming up in October. This year we set the event for Saturday, October 15, from 10 am to 1 pm. We'll conduct our annual 2-hour clean-up of Maidu's undeveloped areas and beyond and then we picnic and socialize for about an hour!

How can you participate? Come to the pavilion near the batting cages and covered roller rink at 10 am on the 15th. The City will supply trash bags for us to use, and you supply yourself, dressed to walk through undeveloped areas (usually knee-high grass and weeds, uneven ground). Gloves can be helpful, and we recommend a hat and/or sunblock as the weather dictates.

Your whole family, or you and your friends may be interested in attending since it is a chance to hunt for trash and explore parts of the park that are less traveled. Perhaps, you'd like to see how nature is coping with the drought, or how far you can see through the weeds. We offer a contest, and we award a small prize or two for the most interesting trash recovered by anyone involved. "Interesting trash?" you may ask. Our impartial judges decide what's "interesting."

Your help will keep our park and nearby open spaces clean. Trash invites trash, so by cleaning up, we let everyone know to treat our park and our neighborhood with respect.

At noon we all return to the pavilion where the Maidu Neighborhood Association will offer free hamburgers, hot dogs, and related picnic fare. That's when the judging of "most interesting trash" takes place and you get to meet neighbors who also take pride in what our neighborhood offers.

So before you dive into Fall decorating or fun Fall festivities, come take a break with your fellow neighbors and help our park look its best.

Sargeant School Fence Update

In our last issue, we mentioned how Chris Kraft, a Maidu neighbor, saw the new fence around Sargeant School and was concerned how it kept neighbors out of the open area next to Willard Dietrich Park. His family had long used the area for recreation.

He understood the school's need to increase security, but he wondered if the Roseville City School District could accommodate both that need and neighbor's access by allowing the grounds to remain open during daytime non-school hours.

Just prior to August's mid-month School Board meeting, he received word from the Superintendent Derk Garcia that the School grounds would be left open during daylight, non-school hours. Chris went to the meeting and spoke, thanked the Board, but asked them to not do this just for Sargeant School, but for the other 17 district schools that were fenced-in over the summer.

Since then, the gates have been open during those times on many occasions. But neighbors have also found them locked sometimes as well. So Chris and some other neighbors went back to the Board at their September 1st meeting to see what the problem is.

Superintendent Garcia and the Board said that they still support having the grounds open to neighbors, but are still working on implementing a process to unlock the school grounds at the appropriate times. This may involve the City of Roseville taking responsibility for opening the grounds on the weekends.

By the time you read this, the September 15th School Board meeting may have taken place and there will be further news. We will continue to monitor what happens. If you are interested in having your feelings on this issue have an impact, please plan to attend a School District meeting (see their web site at www.rcsdk8.org). The first one in October is on the 6th.

Social Media Safety Tips

Do you Facebook? If so, following are some valuable tips to keep you safe.

Don't share your birthday, age, or place of birth. This information could be useful to identity thieves and to data mining companies. A research study by Carnegie Mellon University found that Social Security numbers can be predicted based on such information. Don't publicize vacation plans, especially the dates you'll be traveling. Burglars can use this information to rob your house while you are out of town. Don't post your address, phone number or email address on a social network. Finally, use a strong password for your Facebook account to prevent being hacked. The latest guidance is simply to make it long, say more than 20 characters.
