

Jim Maccoun was raised in Roseville. He received his elementary education at St. Rose School, then attended Jesuit High School in Sacramento. His interest in law enforcement grew from a part time job at the Roseville Police Department while attending Sierra College.

He served the Sacramento Police Department from 1982 till 2014 in every rank from Community Service Officer to Captain in a wide variety of assignments. He was pleased to be able to return to Roseville as the Assistant Chief in 2014, and was promoted to Police Chief in 2017.

He has three adult children and three grandchildren. Maccoun and his wife, Tawnya, live in south Placer County. He enjoys bicycling and any time spent outdoors in the Sierra Nevada.

Community Resources Fair at Maidu Community Center, Saturday, 1/27

We spotted this notice recently and wanted to know more about it since it will take place in our neighborhood.

What does your community have to offer you?

Come out to the Community Resources Fair to connect with programs and services offered to you and your loved ones. 50 non-profit and government agencies can help you locate resources to save you money, support various health conditions, advocate for you and help you navigate life.

We found that the person organizing the event is Bonnie Davis, a City Library technician. We reached out to her and asked for more details. It turns out she ran a smaller version of the same event about a year ago at Mahaney Park. We asked who would want to attend this event.

“I am trying to have something for everyone. Last year I had a Disability Awareness Event. It was well attended. (But) a man came looking for help for his wife with dementia and we didn’t have anything. That’s when I thought we should expand it to include low income, seniors, kids. My son has been clean and sober for 6 years so I wanted AA there. My good friend lost her son so I wanted grief groups and counseling. I am a veteran and we have a Veteran Resource Center at the Downtown Library, there will be vet groups there. My mother has Parkinson’s, so support for that and so on. I am trying to have free help for whatever the need of the person attending.

“It is also a chance for these organizations to recruit volunteers, so if someone were looking for volunteer opportunities...” She left that idea hanging for us to consider. She also gave us a list of the organizations that have agreed to attend so far. They include

Did Santa Bring You a Surveillance Camera?

Do you have a surveillance camera system? Whether or not it was a gift during the holiday, you can keep our neighborhood safer and help the Roseville Police Department solve crimes by registering your camera system in *Keep Watch*, the police department's free, voluntary outside-surveillance camera registry.

If a crime occurs in your area, the Police Department will be able to identify the locations of video surveillance systems in the vicinity, and ask those camera owners to check their systems for potential video evidence. A police officer at one of our meetings related one example. A resident reported a theft, and a local teen was suspected. The teen’s parents had registered their system and gave consent to review their video. It showed their son returning home with the stolen goods!

The registry database is kept confidential, and the police department does not have the ability to directly access your system. You decide if you want to share. Registering would be a gift to the community!

Maidu Park Multi-use Trails due for repaving in 2019

Have you been curious about the condition of the bike trail around Maidu Park? There are many cracks in the asphalt, it's edges break off bit-by-bit, and there is more serious damage in places. Fortunately the City has made it a priority to take care of it.

The bike and pedestrian (i.e. "multi-use") trails running both inside the park and around its outside edges are scheduled to be resurfaced in the summer of 2019 as along as reasonable bids come through.

It has been difficult getting reasonable bid on project around Roseville during this past year since many of the contactors that do this type of work were focused on the Orville Dam spillway-repair project. The heavy rains of last winter and the fall fires in Santa Rosa and other parts of Northern California are also calling on those resources. So it may be hard to get the repaving done at what the City considers a reasonable price. We may have to wait a while longer for the repaving to be done.

While we're waiting, the City is currently repairing any pot holes or dangerous spots that are reported to them by people using the trail. If you see a spot where you think a park trail has gotten unsafe, contact

They will arrange to have an inspection made and any required maintenance work done.

Evening Fitness Programs offered at Maidu Community Center

Thanks to a neighbor, we were contacted recently by Dawn Gonzalez, the Fitness Coordinator for the City's Parks, Recreation & Libraries department who wanted to let us know about evening fitness classes offered at the Maidu Community Center. There are two times these one-hour classes start: at 4:30 and 5:30 p.m.

Dawn said, "We offer affordable, safe, effective, all-level fitness classes with experienced, certified instructors. We are currently offering many new evening fitness classes at Maidu including a Stress Management class (ages 15+) that meets weekly on Thursdays from 4:30-5:30 pm. We offer two-week free trial passes for non-members."

The evening classes, which are for adults of all fitness levels, are as follows:

- Barre (strength and flexibility)
- Yoga
- Ballates (Pilates using the stability ball)
- HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training)
- Stress Management (includes yoga, tai chi, meditation, other stress-management skills)

"Full class descriptions appear on the back of our online, printable schedule" noted Dawn. "Several of these types of classes such as yoga or barre are offered at local studios for many times the cost of our Community Center classes."

To find schedules, more details on classes, and the different options for paying for classes, go to the City's web site at roseville.ca.us and search for "fitness fitness" (yes, enter it twice), then pick the link that says "Fitness (Jan 4, 2018)".
