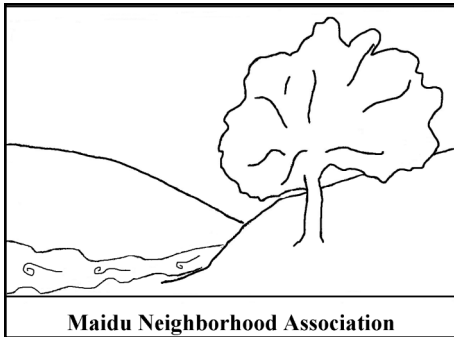

Maidu Park Clean-up on Saturday October 19th

Come join us for our annual Maidu Park Clean-up and Picnic on Saturday, October 19th, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., or for any part of that you have time for! We'll start by gathering at the pavilion by the basketball courts at 10. Wear clothes suitable for exploring the undeveloped parts of the park. Lunch is included for participants.

Four Tree Plantings in Maidu Park Start on November 9th

Lisa Wilson, a representative for the Roseville Urban Forest Foundation (RUFF), spoke at our Tuesday, September 24th Maidu Meeting about its plans including the first of four tree plantings in Maidu Park. It will take place Saturday, November 9th from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Park's east side open space. Only heavy rain will cancel the event.

Signs will be set up directing people from the developed part of the park to the area of the planting. It will take place just beyond the soccer fields in the undeveloped area. The City's Open Space staff is co-sponsoring and helping plan the event.

If you are interested in volunteering, RUFF, suggests

- Wearing work clothes and closed-toed shoes for safety.
- Bringing gloves is recommended.
- You will need to fill out the Roseville Urban Forest Foundation Waiver Form (RUFF can email it to you). If you are under 18, bring a parent to sign your form.
- Let them know you are coming or if you have questions: info@rosevilletree.org

RUFF will provide the tools, snacks and water. About 250 trees will be planted during this event. RUFF will dig the holes for planting, so the work will be mostly placing the saplings and back-filling the holes.

Another Maidu Park tree planting of another 250 trees is planned for Saturday, December 7th. Beyond December, another two plantings are planned, both in the undeveloped parts of the Park. Of the four plantings, two will be in the area at the southeastern part of the Park that burned on June 21, 2013.

RUFF is a local non-profit that works to improve the tree canopy in Roseville through tree plantings and education on the value of trees and how to grow them. If you want a consultation on your existing trees, or about planting new ones, RUFF will send someone to meet with you as a part of Roseville Electric's Shade Tree Program. They also teach several classes through the City Parks department on pruning, fruit tree care, and landscaping. Their web site is www.rosevilletree.org.

Board Annual Election and Audit Results

Garbage Ordinances explained

Our Maidu neighborhood is an area of largely well-kept single family homes with a few multifamily residences. Covenants and restrictions in Huntington Oaks and Johnson Ranch, which were signed and agreed to at change of ownership, require that trash cans be stored out of sight of the street. There are city rules about when the trash cans can be on the street:

9.12.150 Rubbish placement—Collection time—Removing receptacles.

A. Each refuse container shall be placed on the curb or parkway or in the alley for collection, not earlier than the evening preceding and not later than 7:00 a.m. on the day of regular collection. Those containers shall be removed from the curbs, parkways or alleys within 12 hours after the refuse has been collected therefrom.

B. The garbage and refuse collection service is rendered to all properties within the limits of the city, and no service shall be rendered outside the corporate limits of the city. (Ord. 3382 § 1, 1999; prior code § 11.14.)



Commercial properties have a stricter set of rules:

9.12.080 Location of receptacles—Commercial property.

Garbage receptacles at places of business shall be located in such place as shall be convenient to the city for removal of garbage. City-approved trash enclosures are to be used for refuse removal equipment only. Storage of other equipment or material will not be allowed. (Ord. 3382 § 1, 1999; prior code § 11.9.)

Underlying all of this is this basic rule.

9.12.140 Accumulations of garbage prohibited.

It is unlawful for any person to permit garbage, rubbish, or refuse to accumulate upon the premises owned or occupied by such person. (Ord. 2050 § 1, 1987; prior code § 11.12.)

We owe it to ourselves to keep our property neat and in good order and in a manner which maximizes our property values and the peace and tranquility of the area.

More Information on Trash and Hazardous Waste

The City provides a number of ways to get help with your trash, green waste, and hazardous waste disposal. As with most things having to do with the City or City services, the best place to look if you have online access, is the City's web site, Roseville.ca.us.

In what follows we provide a look at what trash and waste services the City provides as a reminder. At the end we'll provide information on finding it online if other means (phone numbers) aren't already provided.

- There's a web site tool for finding out which day is your trash and green waste disposal day and which is just for trash. You search for your street address and a calendar is instantly displayed. If you prefer, you may add the information to your Google, iCal-based, or Outlook calendar. Or you may opt to print your home's schedule for the rest of the year.
- Need to find out where to recycle newspapers, containers, cardboard, plastic, glass or aluminum? Complete online listings of locations, including where to cash redeemable containers, are available.
- New service/Change in service: (916) 774-5780
- Report illegal dumping: (916) 774-5786
- Not sure if something should go into your trash? Use the online "Waste Wizard" to search for items.
 - What about those single-use coffee pods? They go into regular black-can trash.
 - Fats or oils? Those are not to go into a can, so call (916) 774-5780 to arrange free pick-up in a sealed, marked container.
 - Hazardous wastes also can be picked-up for free by calling the same number for an appointment. These include electronics, household and automotive batteries, old thermostats and thermometers containing mercury, fluorescent light tubes and bulbs, and motor oil and filters. Call and ask if you're not sure.
 - Paint? There's a wizard for that too (the closest place is Dunn-Edwards at 1850 Douglas).
- Want to see how your trash gets processed to separate out the recyclables? Tour the landfill (Materials Recovery Facility): (916) 645-5180 [extension 201]
