

I heard about Little Free Libraries while watching TV. There was an announcement for them, what they are, and how to build one. A Little Free Library is a small box on a post that starts off with the builder's old books and then other people can leave some of theirs and take some new ones. It is basically a library except you don't have to have a card to use it and you don't have to check them out. You can just take one.

If you want to start your own Little Free Library, you can buy one or build one. You don't even have to make one from scratch. You can buy a kit or build them out of things like old kitchen cabinets.

If you want to, you can register it so people can find your Little Free Library on a map. If you want to do that, you go to <https://littlefreelibrary.org/registration-process/> and it will tell you exactly what you need to do.

Little Free Libraries have their own website if you want to use that. For videos on how to build one, you go to <https://littlefreelibrary.org/start/> or just look up a video on Youtube. You can get almost all the information you need on YouTube and the Little Free Library website. It can be really helpful if you're stuck or need ideas on how to start.

The owners can get new books, too. Every so often we will go out there if we need a new book and if someone has left a new book, we can take it, read it, and put it back for someone else to enjoy.

It has been a good experience because whenever we walk or drive by it, we always feel good about ourselves for building it to share with everybody else.

So, if you ever need a book or want to donate, you can come over to our Little Free Library at 502 Wrangler Court. Visitors are always welcome!

Editor: Grace and family are not the only folks in the neighborhood sharing books. As Grace mentioned in her article, Library owners can register at the Little Free Library web site and then others can go to the site and search for registered Little Free Library locations.

We have two others nearby that are registered—one at Sargeant School which is there primarily for the students, and another at Campbellini Pizza (formerly Cool River Pizza) on their patio. There is a third one, not registered, that is at the corner of McLaren Drive and Fairmont Court. All are a great contribution to our neighborhood!
