Not Every Maidu Park View is Beautiful

At our most recent meeting, a neighbor brought this sometimes-eye sore to our attention as they were tired of seeing over-flowing bins or items that fall out of them when the containers are being emptied. They contacted the Parks Department and immediately learned that the area inside the fencing there is actually the responsibility of the Environmental Utilities department. If you think about it, that's not really a surprise since they are the ones that handle our trash and green waste at our homes.

This neighbor recently noticed that some late-night revelers had smashed bottles in the adjacent parking lot. When the Parks people were notified, they came out and cleaned-up the broken glass, but they would not clean anything within the bordering Recycling area even though they were equipped to do so.

- 2. Spray fruit trees at this time with a copper fungicidal garden spray such as *Liqui-Cop* to control plant diseases such as peach leaf curl.

Roseville Named 5th Best Place of 2,000 US Cities to Work From Home

The folks at Money.com came up with a timely rating since, they tell us, 38% of adults either telework from home or live with someone who does according to a December US Census survey. And many workers have heard from their employers that they will be allowed to work partially or full time from home even after the pandemic subsides.

Roseville is primed to meet the needs of these remote workers. <u>Money.com</u> named Roseville the 5th best place to live in the U.S. if you work from home.

Money.com analyzed 157,000 data points across nearly 2,000 cities and towns in the U.S. to find the best places to live if you work from home. They selected their starting set of cities by looking for ones with 25,000 residents or more, then eliminated those which had crime rates more than twice the national average, or a median home price over \$615,000 "to avoid suggesting overly expensive places relative to the rest of the country."

Money.com considered the cost of living, safety, and the quality of education in each location. For this list, they also considered the share of residents that worked from home pre-pandemic and prioritized a good at-home setup: enough space to give everyone a room to themselves, heating and cooling comfort, access to necessities like daycare facilities and pharmacies, and, of course, sufficient internet connection. They also factored in being withing a 10-minute walk of a park.



In Roseville at least 98% of residents have adequate internet access at home to support multiple people working and video conferencing simultaneously according to Money.com.

Utility Bill Scam

The City recently received reports of scammers generating automated phone calls to Roseville residents claiming that their bill is past due and they must make an immediate payment to avoid service interruption. Don't call the number they leave in the message. If you need to know the status of your service, call the City of Roseville offices at (916) 774-5300 to verify, or log into your account at roseville.ca.us/billpay. The truth is service disconnections are not being performed at this time due to COVID-19.

Why Your Catalytic Converter is at Risk

For the past several months, the Roseville Police have warned at our meetings that catalytic converter thefts are way up, and it is hard for police to catch them because they can remove them in as little as two minutes. But why the uptick now? The New York Times reports that with tightening air pollution standards world-wide, the price of the precious metals used in the converters has jumped by a multiple of 4 or 5—palladium went from \$500 5 years ago to between \$2,000—\$2,500 today. It can cost \$2,000 or more to replace a converter that is stolen. Talk to your trusted mechanic about steps to help prevent your converter from being stolen.
