Fire's 8th Anniversary Reminds Us to Keep Dry Weather Risks in Mind

On the afternoon of Friday, June 21, 2013, a fire started in the east-central part of Maidu Park, just north of where Parkview ends at the Park. It swept south to McLaren Drive and west nearly as far as Graystock Court. The low, wet areas and firefighters stopped it from going further west, and firefighters put out a few, relatively small fires that started at people's homes across McLaren.

The fire was a wake-up call to neighbors; a reminder that we live next to a wild area that becomes more susceptible to fire during dry weather. The cause of the fire 8 years ago was not positively identified, although it was said at the time that some people were seen in the area shortly before the fire was reported.

In the past few weeks there have been fires in neighborhoods in the Sacramento region that were caused by electrical wiring, a lawn mower causing sparks when hitting a rock, a spilled barbecue, or other reasons. Some of these fires spread to more than one home. With the word “drought” finding its way back into our local weather vocabulary, it is a good time to think about what you may do to protect your home.

One good move would be to take a hard look at your yard to make sure that flammable materials, such as dead vegetation or leaves are cleaned out of the corners, from behind other plants, and out of gutters so a stray cinder from a fire doesn't have fuel to land on. Even if you use a landscaping service, it helps to look around yourself to see that everything is ship-shape.

For its part, the City will use goats and judicious mowing through the Park and local open space areas in the next month or so to decrease the chances that the Park will be the source of a fire.

The 100-year-old Johnson Pool

Here's a bit of interesting history that could also be a part of your future, if you wish. And if you have a pool of your own, you may be interested in the evolution of local pool maintenance since the 1920s.

Johnson Pool, located in downtown Roseville, was built in 1921 by the Central Pacific Railroad and had a close relationship with the Pacific Fruit Express (PFE) ice plant. The plant supplied ice to trains headed east with California produce and other refrigerated goods. PFE was located across the tracks from the Pool, and it supplied water for the Pool via a large pipe that ran under the tracks.

It turns out, this pool needed lots of water—150,000 gallons per day during the summer! The reason? In 1921, pools didn't have the equipment we have today for sanitation such as filters and chemicals such as chlorine. Every night the life guard on duty would empty the pool's “used” water into nearby Dry Creek. The PFE plant supplied the water from its cooling towers to refill the pool for the next day's use.

The Pool is named after David R. Johnson who ran the pool until Roseville purchased it in the 1960s. Since then it has been a City-run pool, and is used recreationally by about 3,000 people and for swim lessons by about 900 children each year. In 2011, “Operation Swim” began through donations from citizens. It offers a swim suit, a towel, and subsidized swim lessons to kids in need at Johnson Pool.

How to Avoid Being a Mail Theft Victim

The Roseville Police Department has seen an increase in mail theft. Not only is it tax season, but this year, many people are receiving federal stimulus cash cards in the mail. The Department offers these thoughts on the topic.

People steal mail because it's lucrative. Thieves find valuable things in mailboxes that they can use or sell right away, like packages, cash, checks and gift cards. Mail thieves also collect personal information for identity theft. Identity theft is a real pain for financial institutions and victims—it takes victims a lot of time and work to clean up a compromised credit history.

How can we protect ourselves from mail thieves? The best strategy is prevention—keep valuables and sensitive financial information out of the mailbox. Here are a few ideas:

- *Go paperless.* Opt to receive financial statements and pay bills electronically—it saves paper and postage, and reduces your risk of identity theft. E-file your taxes and have tax returns deposited directly into your bank.
- *Visit the US Postal Service's website at USPS.com and sign up for their Informed Delivery service.* They'll email you a preview of your incoming mail every day, so you know what to expect. Track packages. If something important isn't delivered, you can follow up immediately with the post office and the sender.
- *Don't send cash or gift cards in the mail.* Most major retailers offer e-gift card options, so you can email your gift card to a friend instead of mailing it. Use free money transfer services like Apple Pay, Venmo or Google Pay instead of mailing checks or cash to family and friends. (If you don't know how, ask a teenager!)
- *Don't let mail sit in the box for long periods of time.* If possible, put your outgoing mail in the box just before your carrier arrives, and pick up your incoming mail as soon as you can after delivery. Never let mail sit in the box overnight. If you're mailing something valuable or with sensitive information, like a tax return, it's safest to take it to the post office for mailing.
- *Taking a trip?* Visit USPS.com and have your mail held at the post office while you're gone. You can either pick it up at the post office or have it all delivered upon your return. Or ask your neighbor/house sitter to collect your mail every day!
