Speaker on Radio Tower at August 23rd Meeting

The City of Roseville will be sending a speaker to our Tuesday, August 23rd meeting at Sargeant School's Multipurpose Room to explain the project that will add a new radio tower on Strauch Drive. The tower will replace the City's existing one in a nearby office building.

The tower will provide better radio coverage for Police and the Fire Department in East Roseville than the current equipment does. At the gathering, located at the pavilion in the park, about 60 people showed up for the event to have friendly conversations with neighbors, City Police and Fire Department staff, and a couple City officials.

National Night Out is an annual event that is promoted as a way for neighbors to get to know one another and "take back the night." It comes from the idea that the better we know our neighbors, the better we can watch out for each other. The City supports the event by having Police and Fire Department members take time to attend in neighborhoods around Roseville.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

If you are new to the Maidu neighborhood, you may not be aware of what a great neighborhood we live in. We have many kind people who are willing to help a neighbor.

In July of this year, 3 neighbors got together with their yard equipment and spruced up a neighbor's front yard. They trimmed shrubs, hacked down weeds, mowed, and hauled away the green waste. The owner of the property had just gone through major surgery for cancer and was in the hospital recovering. No one asked these 3 individuals to do this; no one knocked on their doors, they just got together and did it.

In August, a different neighbor had hip replacement surgery, and a helpful neighbor, knowing she would be incapacitated for a while, went over to her yard and helped out with chores.

Thank you to our neighborhood "good samaritans!" You may not want your name in the newsletter, but you know who you are. We appreciate you.

Overheard at National Night Out

While many of the conversations at our National Night Out event were what you might expect between neighbors, such as how to take care of your swimming pool, or the best shoes to wear when walking around the neighborhood, some were examples unique to this event because Police and the Fire Department were present.

One neighbor told an officer about a vehicle that has appeared frequently in Maidu Park and its driver who has behaved in a way that she found suspicious. Later she learned she'd been talking to Police Chief Troy Bergstrom. She literally took her complaint to the top cop!

Another conversation was between one of the members of the Fire Department from the fire station on Johnson Ranch Drive (across from the Park) and a neighbor. The fireman noted that it had "been a while until he could get a position" at the local Station. He noted that it was desirable to work on our side of town, so the more experienced firemen, like himself, were the ones who worked there.

Conversations like this, and the usual ones, happen at National Night Out every year. Check it out on the first Tuesday evening of every August.

U-Haul Donates Storage Unit for Maidu Neighborhood Association's Use

The 11 acres that used to be the old Roseville Community Hospital building on Sunrise Avenue at Oak Ridge Drive was purchased by U-Haul in January 2017 for \$6.06 million and has since been converted into a self-storage business. One of its selling points is that the units are all climate-controlled.

Recently our Association has been looking for a place to store the equipment we use for our events. Over the years we've accumulated folding tables, signs, banners, a griddle, and supplies. Several Board Members were responsible for storing the gear, but as we've grown it's become a burden, and it can be challenging to go to multiple places to pull together what's needed. We decided it was time to look elsewhere for a solution.

One neighbor volunteered to contact U-Haul International at their headquarters in Phoenix, Arizona, about having a storage unit donated for our use. It took a few calls, but U-Haul gave their approval, and the local location went into action. They identified a unit that has plenty of space for our gear, and earlier this month we moved everything into that unit. The location is convenient for us, and the space we've been offered is generous.

U-Haul Building History as Hospital, then Campus

The Roseville Community Hospital, Roseville's first, was built after World War II and opened in 1952. It served the community until it was sold to Sutter Health in 1993. The City took the money from the sale and put it into a fund that, to this day, gives grants to local non-profits from the interest earned.

In 1997 Sutter opened their new campus at the north end of Sunrise Avenue by Roseville Parkway and sold the old hospital campus to a developer who converted it for educational use. Sierra College offered classes there at what was known as Roseville Gateway. The College moved its classes downtown to its 316 Vernon Street location in 2017, the same year U-Haul bought the campus. Today the HVAC system that once kept patients comfortable now provides consistent storage temperatures year-round.

Our Events—Our Association has developed a tradition of having the following events. We set the dates for each one as the time approaches to match the availability of the people who will help put them on, but they usually don't vary by more than a few weeks from year to year.
