Last Chance: Neighborhood Garage Sale April 29th



Neighborhood Clean-up Event at Maidu Park on Saturday, May 20th

For the second year, the Roseville Coalition of Neighborhood Associations (RCONA) and the City have teamed up to give Roseville residents a chance to get rid of items that won't fit in a trash can without having to drive all the way to the landfill in west Roseville. Environmental Utilities will be bringing 20 foot dumpsters to the Maidu Park on Saturday, May 20th.

Residents will be able to bring their junk to this site at no charge between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. (or until all dumpsters are full). Be sure to have a driver's license or utility bill to show you are a Roseville resident. Where Does Food-for-Soil Stand Today in Roseville?

You've heard of the statewide effort to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from decaying food waste that goes in landfills, and you know friends in the area, like Sacramento, that separate their food waste from their other garbage. But you haven't heard of changes here in Roseville, so what's up?

Because Roseville's black/gray-can waste goes to the mixed waste processing facility in west Roseville where high volume machinery helps separate various types of trash, Roseville residents can continue to use the two-can system for everything:

- Use the black or gray can for food trash and food-soiled papers, household trash, and recyclables. At the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), they will compost the food waste, and syphon off recyclable materials before sending the remaining material to the landfill.
- Use your green can for green waste (plant based) including uncooked vegetables. The MRF will compost these materials as well.

The City will continue to evaluate this approach, and it is possible that in three to five years they could move to a curbside (separated) food-waste system. Anything we're not already used to doing that might change will come with plenty of advanced warning.

The rates we pay for garbage collection already account for any additional labor or other costs because of the Food-for-Soil program. Rates are reviewed by the City every two years to be sure they will cover expected costs.

What about black/gray can odors, or attracting pests? Here is the City's answer:

We recognize the odor and pest issues regarding food waste collection when this waste is set loose in the bin. We are in the process of determining the best and most cost-effective approach to these issues. [In piloting options,] (s)ome residents used one option to store food in the refrigerator or freezer and only place the material in their bin on collection day. Or, as part of the pilot, customers have placed their green waste at the bottom of their container to create a liner to reduce sludge generation. Unfortunately, plastic liner bags are not allowable at this time.

The frequency of emptying the two cans remains the same, i.e., your black or gray can weekly, and your green can every other week. Again, if the City feels that changes to this schedule need to be made, they will provide us with plenty of time to prepare for any changes.



The overall state goal is to reduce statewide organic waste disposal by 75% by 2025. Roseville is taking the additional step to work with grocery stores and

food distributors who may have excess food to divert it to local food banks, soup kitchens, and food recovery organizations. More food for anyone hungry, and less food waste sounds like a win-win.
