Maidu Neighborhood Association By-Law Change Proposed

There is a proposal before the Maidu Neighborhood Association Board to change the Association's bylaws as follows:

- Today, a two signatures are required on an Association-issued check if the amount exceeds \$200.
- In recognition of today's greater expenses, the proposal calls for the amount requiring two signatures on an Association check be raised to \$500.

This news article serves as the required pre-notice of the intent of the Board to vote on this change at the June meeting. The argument for making the change is that the number of \$200 or greater checks has increased over the years as costs rise and some scope of some of our activities has increased. All spending for events is monitored by the board, and each event has a budget assigned to it in advance. Given these facts, the Board is being asked to increase the amount of a check to \$500 before a second board-member signature is required to issue the check.

In a related move, the Board voted at the April meeting to set the cash reserve, i.e., the amount the Association holds in reserve should we lose sponsorship, to \$2,000. This amount will allow us to continue publishing the newsletter and sponsor some events while searching for another sponsor. The Board can change the reserve amount as current needs dictate.

Garage Sale Day Dodges Rain and Brings in Customers

It started to look like rain could threaten the Maidu Neighborhood Garage Sale, Saturday, April 27, but the rain came the day before, a few showers, and Saturday dawned clear

Maidu History Alive and Well

Next in our continuing series on neighbors to watch is a fascinating individual who decided to follow his interest in archeology and antiquities and has spent the last 30 years honing his artistic skills. Chuck Kritzon attended a class where the artists were world class and he learned the basics which led to more classes. Beginning with stone engraving often depicting symbols of ancient meaning, he also engraves glass, about both of which he is bursting with knowledge regarding the stories behind the images.

He explains that ten percent of all indigenous people in the North America were located in California due to the vast resources and comfortable weather conditions. Chuck has studied the past and now recreates the same artifacts the early inhabitants had – pine seed necklaces, string from plant fibers, fishing hooks from bones, necklaces from shells, whistles form stems. Among other Hawaiian artifacts, he has recreated a <u>konane</u> game, a round stone with multiple indentations, used with lava and coral shells to pass the time waiting to get permission to cross into neighboring districts in earlier times (see left picture).



He is prolific enough to have a collection of art that is currently on display at the Persimmon Art Gallery in Auburn. All colors and textures are derived in the same way the ancient inhabitants did, from stones, plants and animals available to them.

Chuck also leads ancient art summer camps at the Maidu Indian Museum and gives interpretive nature hikes in the area (sometimes to home schoolers),

All this is in his spare time. He actually has a job that isn't this. This is his passion and it shows that you do great work when you love what you do.
