Placer County Rezoning Just Outside Maidu Neighborhood By Lance Hibben

In May 2024, The Placer County Board of Supervisors took action to rezone 13 privately-owned properties throughout the county to help meet state requirements for high-density multi-family housing. The board voted 3-2 to move forward with the rezone plan. Supervisors Shanti Landon (District 2) and Chair Suzanne Jones (District 4) voted "no."

One of these rezoning sites sits near the boundary of the Maidu Neighborhood and is referred to as Site 29. Site 29 is located at 3865 Old Auburn Blvd. near Sierra College Blvd., and is a 4.8-acre lot in which 96 housing units are planned for construction. Currently, there is a single-family 1,220 square foot home located on this property.

The county's efforts undertaking the rezone program was required by the State of California as part of the Placer County General Plan Housing Element which outlines the county's housing goals, policies, and objectives. Within Placer County's current 8-year housing cycle, it was required to accommodate an additional 1,219 high-density multi-family housing units to maintain compliance with State requirements. *(continued on page 3)*

Jurisdictions that fall out of compliance can face stiff penalties from the state, including the loss of local land-use authority, and financial fines. Another likely penalty would be the implementation of "builder's remedy," which would allow developers to build housing without adhering to the county's residential design and development standards.

The approved development of 96 high density multiple-story homes combined with other unrelated nearby new developments will have an impact on our area. Most significant are changes to the rural aesthetics and increased traffic along Old Auburn Blvd. Maidu neighbors who are interested in learning more about Site 29 are encouraged to attend our October 22nd monthly MNA neighborhood meeting. Placer County Supervisor Suzanne Jones, who represents us, will be attending the meeting to discuss concerns. Come to learn more about Site 29, related issues, and what can be done to mitigate impact.
