Parks and Rec Team Answers Neighbor Questions

At our February 25 meeting a team of four Parks, Recreation and Libraries (PRL) Department members met about 35 neighbors at Sargeant School to answer their questions about Maidu Park. The PRL team members were Director Jill Geller, Manager Jeff Nereson, Planner Tara Gee, and Manager Brian Castelluccio.

is trying to decide where to move the Story Board Walk elsewhere in Maidu Park. She noted they didn't know where they would go, or when they would be moved yet. She also told us that the story in the Story Walk is supposed to change about once a quarter.

Neighbors asked about the concrete memorial benches along the nature trail east of the soccer fields. Jill noted there was one more foundation in place for another bench, but that would be the last one, for seven total. One neighbor felt the fact that the benches were paid for by families was flawed and said, "You are rewarding the wealthy who can afford a bench. I can't afford to have a bench."

Another neighbor asked about the four trees in front of the soccer fields' main entrance by the parking lot—she had heard from a Parks employee that they would be cut down. Brian quickly assured her that there were no plans to cut them down. He noted that there is nothing on the ground there but dirt, so they are looking to improve on that.

The availability of the soccer fields was another source of questions. Jill noted that the field improvements were done to make them more attractive to play on, and safer as well (no dips or bare patches). The type of grass used goes dormant in the colder weather which is why the fields are closed during that time, i.e., so they are not torn-up. Brian noted that on other fields, as the grass grew over several seasons, it recovered from its dormant state and filled back in faster each year, so it is possible they will be able to open the fields earlier in the future.

Someone noted that, despite the soccer field closure until March 31st, the Quad-ball players (a spin-off of Quidditch) had been allowed to play on the field in early February. Jeff, as the program director, said he had been nervous about letting those games to go forward because of the potential for damage, but he said allowing them to use it generated enough good will with the Quad ball league that they will be scheduling a much larger tournament here in Roseville next year. However, it will not take place a Maidu Park, but at the new Roseville Soccer Complex being completed late this year in west Roseville. Those fields have artificial turf.

Another neighbor asked about insecticide and herbicide spraying in the Park and asked if there could be some warning when it is going to be done. Brian answered that they use a minimal approach, using the lowest levels of effective chemicals. Nonetheless, he said they would look into how they might provide warning to Park users.

One neighbor wanted to know why have people walk on the left. Jill said the idea is that you are walking "against" the higher speed traffic so you can be more aware and avoid potential injury. [Editor's Comment: It was probably also easier to get walkers to move left since bicycles are legally supposed to ride on the right on streets. Much more on this topic on the internet...]

Why did the City stop renting out the batting cages? Demand for them declined over time as costs to maintain the equipment increased. So PRL decided to stop using them at both this location and another location on the west side of the City. An informal, on the spot poll of attendees found that folks were 14 -4 in favor of converting the batting cages area into a pickleball court.

Will the sixth soccerfield, shown on the Park's master plan document, ever be built? Tara answered that, like other items on the master plan, this would have public review before being done. She noted that there is no funding for that field to be built, so it is unlikely to happen any time soon, if at all.

Neighbors were pleased that the Parks staff showed up for the meeting and were so frank about answering our questions. Jill, Brian, Tara and Jeff were applauded at the end their presentation.

Our next Maidu meeting will be on **Tuesday**, **March 25th at 6:30 p.m.** During the school year, we meet at the **Sargeant School Multi-purpose Room** which is **to the left side of the front of the school on the Ridgecrest side.** Join us for a police report and catch up on neighborhood goings-on.

Spring Clean-up days are scheduled on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the following locations:

- April 12: Saugstad Park, 100 Buljan Drive
- April 26: Bridgeway Church, 8150 Industrial Avenue (near Roseville DMV)
- May 17: St John's Church, 2351 Pleasant Grove Blvd
- May 31: Bridgeway Church, 8150 Industrial Avenue

The volunteer shifts are:

- 7:30-10AM
- 10AM-12:30PM
- 12:30-3PM

You can sign up for more than one shift.

What do volunteers do:

- 7:30am shift helps set up needed equipment (event starts at 8am).
- Check IDs. This event is for Roseville residents only.
- Direct cars to available bins for dumping.
- Assist residents by helping them unload their junk into bins.
- 12:30-3pm shift tears down equipment and cleans area.

Breakfast Danish and drinks will be provided for early shift. Lunch (Sandwiches & Chips) will be provided for the 2nd and 3rd shifts. Water will be available all day.
